A poem at the beginning of a novel, written by Thomas Parke D'Invilliers gives us an idea of what the whole story is about – it is about a young man named Jay Gatsby, who was totally in love with a girl named Daisy, but she came from the higher class and he was quite poor but willing to do everything he could to gain her. So he made a break-through by running some illegal business, and when he earned enough money, he bought a large mansion on the West Egg shore overlooking Daisy's house. He became popular by throwing parties every Saturday night, but he actually did it because he was hoping, that some day she would appear at his doorstep. And she eventually did...
