Marine biologists have discovered the world's smallest seahorse hidden among the coral reefs deep in the Flores Sea, off the coast of.

The seahorse was identified by scientists from McGill University in Montreal, Quebec, in Canada, and from the Bishop Museum in Honolulu, Hawaii. People had seen this seahorse before, but they had mistaken it for the juvenile of another species.

The species, *Hippocampus denise*, is no longer than 16 millimeters from its snout to the tip of its tail, though some pregnant males as small as 13 millimeters in length have been recorded. That's smaller than some human fingernails—those that aren't bitten, anyway!
