AT

1. With exact times. at 7 o'clock

2. With holidays/religious festivals at midnight, at Christmas, at Easter

in July

3. With "night". at night

4. With "the beginning" and "the end". at the beginning of the lesson5. With "the weekend". at the weekend

ON

1. With days.

on Friday

2. With dates. on 2nd may 3. With a day + morning, afternoon etc. on Wednesday

UNTIL/TILL

To mean "up to" a certain time. I slept until/till 9.30, until/till they left BY

To mean "before" or "not later than". by 4, by the time I leave

DURING

To mean "in" or "for" a period of time. during the night You can use it only after answer to the question "When?".

FOR

Use for with a period of time. It answers the question "How long?". Example: for six months, for five minutes. for combing

FOR+ING - to show purpose

BY+ING - to say, how we do something by blowing
